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Cut these out. They are every sound the pictures in this pack need, and nothing else.

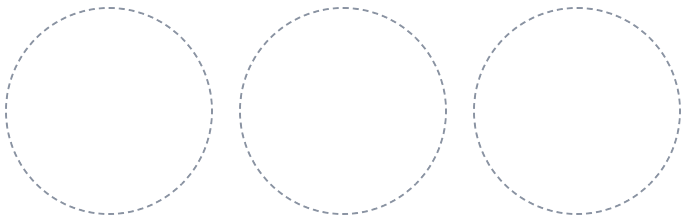
✂ **Consonants** One tile is one sound. Cut them out and keep them in an envelope.

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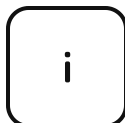
Elkonin Sound Boxes: How to Use Them

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For the grown-up. Ten minutes, one word at a time — tonight's word from school, from a story, or your child's own name.

One box for each sound — not each letter

fish



Four letters, **three sounds**. **sh** is one sound, so it takes one box. English does not let you count sounds by counting letters — which is exactly why the boxes help.

Do it together — five steps

1. **Adult** says the word slowly, stretching each sound. Mmm-aaa-p.
2. **Kid** puts a sound tile in a box for each sound they hear.
3. **Kid** touches each dot and says that sound on its own.
4. **Kid** sweeps along the arrow and blends the sounds.
5. **Kid** takes the tiles off and writes the word, saying each sound.

You are in every session. Step 1 is the whole scaffold — your child cannot pull a word apart into sounds until they hear it pulled apart. Say it again, slower, whenever they stall. Never spell it for them.

Worth knowing

- **No letters yet? Use the counters.** Same five steps, one counter per sound, no spelling. That is where a four-year-old starts.
- **Green to red.** The dots and the arrow are the direction the word is read — first sound on green, last on red.
- **Count sounds, not letters, to pick the page.** *up* → 2. *ship*, *rain* → 3. *frog* → 4. *stamp* → 5.
- **Two letters can be one sound.** *sh*, *ch*, *th*, *ck*, *ee*, *ai* and the doubles (*ll*, *ss*, *ff*) each take one box.
- **There is no q tile.** *q* never works alone — use *qu*. It says two sounds, /k/ and /w/, and most teachers keep it in one box.
- **x is two sounds**, /k/ and /s/. Let the *x* tile straddle two boxes, or use *k* and *s*.



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
